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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Shri Chinai College of Commerce & Economics is a primeval college affiliated to the University of Mumbai, it was established in the year 1963. The College was formerly set up by Laxmi Education Society and was managed with grace till 2006-2007. Later from 2007-2008, it was taken over by Laxmi Charitable Trust which was set up in the memory of Shri Mathuradas Vissanji, Sheth Laherchand Uttamchand Jhaveri and Shri Jivanlal Chinai by their descendant Shri Pratap Singh Vissanji, Shri Pratap Bhogilal and Shri Rasiklal Chinai.

Shri M.C Chagla, Union Minister for Education graced the ceremonial inauguration and the first term commenced in June 1963 with affiliation to the University of Mumbai. Although the college started in 1963 with an ambitious to provide quality education, it gradually extended the scope of philosophy and became a unique college where we aims to fabricate a safe, nurturing yet thought-

provoking environment which is built on positive relationships and developing the student emotionally, socially and academically.

The college initially started with Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com) course and also added courses like Bachelor of Management Studies (B.M.S) from the academic year 2000-2001, Bachelor of Commerce in Banking & Insurance (B.B.I) and Bachelor of Commerce in Accounts & Finance (B.A.F.) was started form the academic year 2004-2005 and Bachelor of Commerce in Financial Markets (B.F.M.) was commenced from the academic years 2008-2009.

From the commencement of this courses till date all courses of our college are running successfully and enabled to impart quality education to our students and helps them to be an elegant and responsible citizen of the nation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai and adopts the syllabus provided by the University and develops a curricular design for course delivery within the framework and guidelines of the affiliating University. The curricular planning as envisaged and monitored by the IQAC is systematic and documented through academic calendar, teaching plans and other reports and a system of continuous internal assessment which are prepared in advance across all programs.

The college makes a conscious effort to include Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum by weaving them as seamlessly as is possible into the curriculum using a multipronged approach where in classroom teaching is augmented by organising various activities which draw attention to these issues as part of project work and field work by students. Ethical professional and business practices are part of courses of accountancy, business ethics and corporate governance. Gender issues are addressed in the syllabi of courses like Foundation Course, Media Gender and Culture, Advertising in Contemporary Society and Media Studies. Importance of human values like tolerance, peace and communal harmony are a part of the Foundation Course subject where various activities are organised which inculcate values of kindness and sensitivity towards the deprived sections of society. The college also offers courses like Environmental Studies, Environment Management Foundation Course. Classroom teaching is supplemented by guest lectures on environment protection and sustainability coupled with projects where students collect plastic bottles. This integrated approach of classroom teaching and actual action ensure that these issues are addressed effectively.

The IQAC collects feedback from stakeholders like students, teachers, and alumni the feedback is discussed in the meetings and action taken report is prepared after incorporating the suggestions.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has adequate well qualified faculty and they are encouraged to enhance their qualification. Our

college uses a blended approach to teaching and learning. Enrolment to the college is through a transparent admission process as per the guidelines of University of Mumbai and the reservation policy of the State government. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Shri Chinai College provides a spacious complex of infrastructure for staff and students. The office, auditorium, and the staff common room on the ground floor are air- conditioned. Students are provided with common room, canteen, gymkhana and a playground. The seminar hall is on the second floor and there is a well-equipped computer labs especially for the students, water coolers and toilet blocks are provided for students.

Our college always aims at providing quality education to their students. However aiming this concept in mind our college has updated and upgraded several infrastructure facilities within the college premises. In order to provide adequate facilities and quality education to the students.

There are total 18 classrooms. 5 out of 18 classrooms having the capacity to accommodate 100- 120 students and remaining 13 classrooms having the capacity to accommodate 60- 65 students. 5 classrooms are enabled with white board and marker facility. Shri Chinai College provides adequate Information Technology Infrastructure enable facilities to its teachers, students and other staff. The college computer lab is located on the ground floor having square feet 300 sqft the usage of computer lab is for practical lectures of computer systems and applications. This college laboratory is also available to students to browse education content and for project work and so on. The laboratory has 41 computers for college students having proper internet connection, effective Wi- Fi and a projector for lecture demonstration. Our students also make use of computer laboratory for filling their scholarship and free ship forms with due consultation with the laboratory staff. In 1963, the Shri Chinai College of Commerce and Economics Library were established in a tiny classroom with a few collections. Our library is currently housed on the second floor of the building, occupying 2442 square feet. The SOUL 3.0 library software automates some library functions. The library's collection includes a sizable amount of dictionaries, storybooks, religious texts, encyclopedias, and textbooks. Students and staff members can record their attendance in separate registers kept by the library.

Student Support and Progression

The college has a well-functioning framework in place to support students' overall growth in their academic, co curricular and extracurricular activities. The needy students are identified and benefitted through scholarships and freeship provided by government agencies. In order to increase the employability of its students, the college has also started offering several capability enhancement courses, such as bridge courses and soft skills development. In addition, a number of talks and events are planned to help people comprehend the value of yoga and meditation in daily life. The College has an Anti-Ragging Committee, a Women Development Cell, and a Students Grievance Cell that investigates and promptly resolves student issues. Additionally, we support a zero tolerance stance. Every year, the college's placement cell is effective in giving students chances for appropriate placement. In keeping with the college's overall goal of student development, the Sports Committee and Cultural Committee engage in a wide range of activities throughout the academic year. The Alumni Association, which keeps in touch with all graduates, facilitates a network of past and present students; our college's alumni association is not yet registered, but it will be shortly. The alumni students actively support their alma mater by engaging in cultural competitions as expert judges and by conducting seminars and

workshops for the students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

To ensure that the Institution is efficiently managed and administered the college follows a time tested and successful as well as a competent secretarial constitution comprising of: The Management, The Principal, The Heads of the meetings with all the Heads of the departments regarding academic activities, Departments, The Faculty Members. The Incharge Principal conducts regular following up on the academic calendar, students' progress, etc. The heads of the departments regularly conduct departmental meetings with all the members of their faculty to ensure that the various committees that have been constituted are functioning effectively to ensure maintenance as well as continuous improvement in the quality of the teaching-learning process.

Institute major area of focus is facilitating high-quality knowledge, development of competencies and skills, enabling to handle the technological challenges, fostering human values and all-round development. Institute aims to follow vision and mission strategies to achieve growth. Our institute is transparent and fair in giving promotion and increments. There is an annual review meeting held by head of the departments with teaching members to see the growth and area of improvements. Institute also encourage teachers to attend Faculty Development Programme and Research work to boost academic performance. Institution always nurture innovation, creativity, research work and experiment, cross fertilization of thoughts and ideas, freedom for students and faculty to think and evolve for the betterment of oneself and the Institution. All the staff members are treated on par with each other in obtaining benefits from the institution.

The Institution has a well-organized structure to carry out administration. Finance department conducts regular financial audits to ascertain recurring and non-recurring expenditure by inviting external auditors every financial year. In Finance module, the student fees, purchase and other expenses are recorded in tally. Institution uses biometric as a tool to monitor attendance of staff members, online admission of students, to manage library database. During pandemic college conducted online lectures via Google Meet and examinations via Jvirus. Institute conducts regular meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), timely submission of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) to NAAC; Feedback collected, analyzed and used for improvements.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Planning a curriculum through the academic calendar:

Shri Chinai College of Commerce and Economics adheres to the University of Mumbai's rules for its syllabus and examination format because it is connected with the university. Every year, the academic calendar is planned. It consists of extracurricular, co-curricular, and academic evaluation activities. Departments, Committees, and Cells submit the criteria for the academic calendar, which is then authorized by IQAC. All parties involved are given access to the academic calendar for implementation. Periodically, the Academic Calendar is examined and verified. Subject allocation for teachers at the department level is determined by their workload. A schedule is made and followed. Subject-specific requirements inform the development and approval of lesson plans.

Curriculum Planning:

In addition to lecture tactics, participatory, experimental, and demonstrative teaching-learning approaches are employed to create a holistic teaching-learning experience. Teachers can ascertain students' learning levels more successfully by employing the previously described strategies. They can then assign assignments and provide periodic feedback in the classroom to aid in the students' learning based on those levels. Additionally, question banks and other study materials are given to students. Regular administration of formative and summative evaluations is a priority for the department.

Continuous Internal Evaluation:

The College's ongoing internal assessment and evaluation procedures are laid out in the Academic Calendar. Oral exams, group discussions, multiple-choice questions, seminars, presentations, brainstorming sessions, remedial lectures, practical's, projects, and class tests are methods of the evaluation techniques that the department gets ready for. As an affiliated college, tests at the university level are administered in compliance with the university schedule, and summative assessments are carried out internally as well as at the college level. Field tours, guest lectures, industry visits, and other similar activities are frequently incorporated into effective curriculum delivery. The college provides extra practice sessions, remedial lectures, and bridge courses to assist weak learners. By using these steps, we make sure that students do well on the university exam. The college periodically administers surveys to students to gauge their level of satisfaction with the curriculum delivery.

Response:

Shri Chinai College of Commerce and Economics is affiliated with the University of Mumbai and hence follows the syllabus approved by the Board of Studies. The college has subject-specific mechanisms to handle cross-cutting issues. When the University prescribes a new syllabus, cross-cutting topics are pointed out/identified individually in the areas of Professional Ethics, Gender issues, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability. After identifying the cross-cutting issues, the College ensures that these issues are addressed to raise awareness about the area through events scheduled in the Academic Calendar.

The following are the cross-cutting issues:

Professional Ethics: The University of Mumbai's syllabus has included specific subjects on professional ethics across all commerce programs. Some of them include the Indian Constitution, Introduction to Ethics in Business & Organization Culture, workplace inspiration, scientific perspective, methodology, scientific writing and ethics in scientific research, and the ethical issues underlying the use of social media for communication.

Human Values: According to the syllabus human values are highlighted in the encompassing cross-cutting issues like human inequality, human rights, understanding stress and conflicts, managing stress and conflicts in contemporary society, urbanization and environment, human rights violations and redressal, as well as soft skills for improving interpersonal communication.

Gender Sensitization: The concepts of disparity and gender inequality are highlighted in the course as part of the cross-cutting topics for gender sensitization.

Environmental sustainability: In the university curriculum, issues like ecology—including its sustainable development, the environment and ecosystem, natural resources, urbanization, eco-tourism, biological prospecting etc. are emphasized.

Integration of College activities with the Cross-cutting issues: The cross-cutting issues listed from the syllabus of the University of Mumbai are considered and accordingly the seminars/workshops are scheduled and executed by the various departments and committees of the College to sensitize the students in the respective areas. The College organizes educational programs on various issues related to gender equality, rights of women. DLLE department of our College organizes visits to NGO's, to

sensitize our students about the problems faced by the underprivileged section of the society. Blood donation camp by DLLE department in association with hospitals, “Career Project” and “Survey for Women Status” by DLLE department is also organized for the students for understanding various aspects of sensitization and human values .Environmental support is actively provided by our college, with events such as cleaning up the environment and planting trees being planned by the environment department. Beach clean-ups and campaigns to foster a clean and healthy environment are organized by our college, emphasizing our commitment to environmental sustainability.

The institution arranges industrial tours to Alok Industries Limited textile industry (Silvassa), Marudhara Polypack Pvt. Ltd, (Jodhpur), Steel Bird Helmets Hi- Tech India Ltd, (Chandigarh), as well as additional industries to give students practical experience in the workplace. The college also organizes talks. The college also provides talks by professionals in several subjects, which promotes vicarious learning.

Participatory learning is an approach in which students take an active role in learning from their peers, making education more exciting and pleasurable. Activity-based learning includes participation in several departmental academic competitions held at the college, as well as overseas training programs. Essay writing, elocution, open mike, mock trading, quiz competitions, poster making, and other activities are organized at the college level, and students are encouraged to participate in these events. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institute, affiliated with the University of Mumbai, has undertaken comprehensive internal and external evaluations in accordance with university standards. The seven programs use the Choice based Credit System (CBCS), which assigns credits depending on syllabus content. Student evaluations are based on Continuous Internal Assessment and Semester End Examinations, with weightages of 25% and

75%, respectively.

During the orientation program, the Principal, Vice-Principal, or Coordinator informs students about internal assessment, question paper formats, and university exams through faculty-specific opening addresses. Students learned about the internal evaluation grading schemes, passing scores, and attendance requirements during the orientation program. The lecturers always encouraged the students to discuss their questions with them in order to get their questions answered. The results of a midterm exam were released in compliance with university policies. All of the subject matter experts planned lectures for remediation and Q&A sessions. On the websites of the Institute and the affiliated Universities, the public could access the rules, curricula, and syllabi of every program the college offered. In this context, the university circulars are distributed occasionally to the academic staff and administrative personnel, and they are also shared in the student WhatsApp groups for the class. Schedules for internal examinations are shared on the class WhatsApp group.

The exam specifications were included in the regulations. The company ensures that evaluation procedures are open and truthful. In order to facilitate continuous student internal assessment, professors also give subject-specific internal tests in addition to the standard exams, Vivas, projects, assignments, and presentations.

Response:

Shri Chinai College provides a spacious complex of infrastructure for staff and students. The office, auditorium, and the staff common room on the ground floor are air- conditioned. Students are provided with common room, canteen, gymkhana and a playground. The seminar hall is on the second floor and there is a well-equipped computer labs especially for the students, water coolers and toilet blocks are provided for students.

Management class rooms are air conditioned and also equipped with PCs, sound system and T.V, modern teaching aids like LCD projector.

Our college always aims at providing quality education to their students. However aiming this concept in mind our college has updated and upgraded several infrastructure facilities within the college premises. In order to provide adequate facilities and quality education to the students.

Our College auditorium is located on the first floor of the college building. It is owned by the governing body and to be made available as and when required. It is fully air conditioned with capacity of 181 seating. It is equipped with projector and sound system.

There are total 18 classrooms. 5 out of 18 classrooms having the capacity to accommodate 100- 120 students and remaining 13 classrooms having the capacity to accommodate 60- 65 students. 5 classrooms are enabled with white board and marker facility. Each and every classroom having proper ventilation that is a big window. And proper space for students to accommodate for other activities. There are five classrooms having smart class facility i.e ICT enable facilities, LMS etc. All five classrooms are equipped with a computer system and projector. Faculty members make use of these systems to demonstrate presentations and other subject related content to the students.

The college computer lab having total number of computer System i.e 59, number of System enable with LAN and Internet Facility i.e 38. As far as office and staff room is concerned remaining 18 computer systems are placed in college office and Library for administrative work and staffroom for the use of teaching staff.

The vast infrastructure of the college is maintained by keen involvement and care by the staff under supervision of the management. A daily survey of different rooms is taken by an office clerk to record

needs of repairs/ damage necessary arrangements viz. Electric repairs, fittings & replacement of lights/ fans. Repairs of furniture and other fixtures, Plumbing and cleaning of water tanks, Drinking water taps, cleaning of toilet blocks & playground. Two gardeners take care of the lawn and trees surrounding the playground.

The college managing committee look after the maintenance of sports activities. Our college has a separate playground for the outdoor games. Through which our students can showcase and also fulfil their talent at the fullest. The sports coaches are given a freedom to fix the time slot and prepare the schedule accordingly for the practice of their respective sports on the ground. The college grounds are fully utilized during various cultural programmes as well as during sports events organized by the college.

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

In 1963, the Shri Chinai College of Commerce and Economics Library was established in a tiny classroom with a few collections. Our library is currently housed on the second floor of the building, occupying 2442 square feet. The SOUL 3.0 library software automates some library functions. The library's collection includes a sizable number of dictionaries, storybooks, religious texts, encyclopedias, and textbooks. Students and staff members can record their attendance in separate registers kept by the library. Textbooks are also given to students who require them for an extended length of time via the book bank program.

Owing to space constraints, the reading hall's greatest amount of space has been prioritized. Therefore, there isn't a designated area for relaxing. At a time 100 students can be easily accommodated in the college library. Proper seating arrangements are made available for the students. Working hours of the college library works from Monday to Friday from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm and on Saturdays from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm. It becomes simpler for the students to access the books within no time. Student comes to libraries for reading, study or reference. Libraries contain a variety of materials. Libraries should inform their users of what materials are available in their collections and how to access that information. The college library provides a quiet study space for students on campus;

Our college Library is also a member of National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (NLIST). The user id and password to access the same is displayed on the library notice board. Alerts about lists of new additions and books received for approval are sent to the teaching staff from time to time. The college Library also organizes book exhibitions to display the broad of books held in store. Student's valuable recommendations are also been considered for purchase of new books. Due to the space constraint, priority has been given to provide maximum space for reading hall. Hence there is no separate space for lounging. The library uses compact shelving for storing books. The library is partly computerized and with the help OPAC, it becomes easy for the students to access the books within no time. Alerts about lists of new additions and books received for approval are sent to the teaching staff. The College Library organizes exhibitions to display the broad array of books held in store.

Student recommendations are also considered for purchase of new books. Books are issued on library cards i.e one text book for one week. Reference books are not issued for home but are for reading in the library itself. Books are issued on oral request of students who may search the authors/ title index. All books are issued on first come, first served basis. Damage to books is claimed by way of fine. The books which are lost are to be replaced or cost of the books is recovered.

The laboratory has 41 computers for college students having proper internet connection, effective Wi- Fi and a projector for lecture demonstration. Besides those nine computers are made available for office administrative purpose, three computers are equipped for staff room i.e. for teaching staff, two computers are engaged in college library and four computers are used for delivering lectures in the class room for PowerPoint presentation and so on. Bandwidth of internet connection in the institution is 100 MBPS is made available for Laboratory, library, principal's cabin, college office and Staff room and the internet service provider was Reliance Jio. College computer laboratory enables college students and staff to make proper use of IT infrastructure for their studies purpose. Student's uses computer lab for making PowerPoint presentations, charts, assignment, excel work, data work and so on. Such arrangements develop interest of our students towards technical and practical skills which will lead to generate greater scope of enhancement in their overall skills and performance. Many a time teaching staff of our college make use of computer laboratory for demonstrating practical sessions and lectures. The college management appoints a full time lab assistant who will look after towards the systematic work to be carried out on a daily basis. All the computers are enabling with firewall and Anti- virus software. Our college internal staff looks after the maintenance of computer lab. College computer lab provides proper facilities to the college students and the entire lab is fully air-conditioned, and has a washroom facility and proper sitting arrangements. The internal staff looks after the maintenance of printers and LCDs from time to time. Our students also make use of computer laboratory for filling their scholarship and free ship forms with due consultation with the laboratory staff. Teaching staff uses computer laboratory for University of Mumbai CAP purpose and for paper assessment as well. We do believe in providing and rendering delightful services not only to our staff but also for our beloved students. The college laboratory will focus on more interesting activities with the changing demand keeping in mind students interest and solace.

General Provident Fund scheme is in practice for staff members of self-financing courses. Retirement pension as per Government rules and regulations to aided teaching and non-teaching staff. Duty leaves are granted to the teaching staff to attend various Orientation/Refresher/Seminar/workshops/Training Programs as per the decisions taken by Management (As per the Norms of University of Mumbai). Regular increments are added to Basic Pay on a periodic basis. There is a designated parking area on campus where employees are free to park their two-wheelers or four-wheelers. The faculty is encouraged, and support provided to attend various seminars and conferences and present papers at these forums as it leads to exchange of ideas. The 360-degree performance appraisal mechanism is followed by institute to provide a complete picture of faculty performance and aids in providing constructive feedback and developing the human resources of the institution. The institution also encourages the faculty in their research endeavours by providing them all necessary support such as utilization of institutional resources, infrastructure facilities, financial support, flexible work hours etc.The College provides gratuity benefit to the permanent staff as per “The Payment of Gratuity Act” when the staff resigns or is provided with super annuities.

Work-life balance is promoted by putting in place flexible leave policies and other support mechanisms to manage obligations on both a personal and professional level. The organization provides a range of leave choices, including as sick leave, maternity leave, and casual leave, to both teaching and non-teaching staff.

Teaching and non teaching staff are granted sick leave if they are unable to work due to medical conditions. Maternity leave is granted to female employees who are pregnant. There is a full or partial offer of paid maternity leave. Workers may take unpaid leaves of absence for private reasons.

Adequate canteen facility is have been established in campus premises, available for use by personal during standard business hours and beyond. Employees are provided complimentary WIFI and Internet access in staffroom as well as in library. A green and clean atmosphere is essential for the employees' and students' well-being. Institute provides a number of facilities for the wellbeing of its staff. The staff rooms, office spaces are air-conditioned. The college's campus is full of trees and large open air campus, with immaculate lawns, a properly kept cricket pitch, refrigerator, RO Clean drinking water facilities, and a continuous electrical supply. General community maintenance and housekeeping are handled by a pleasant and responsive crew.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Financial audit aims at ensuring financial transparency, essential for the smooth running of the institution. Institution conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis. Institute maintains and follows a well-planned process for the mobilization of funds and resources. The process of mobilization of funds involves various committees of the institute, the Department Heads and Accounts officer. Institute has designed some specific rules for the fund usage and resource utilization.

Utilization of funds: A finance committee has been constituted to monitor the optimum utilization of funds for various recurring and non-recurring expenses. The purchase committee seeks quotations from vendors for the purchase of equipment, computers, books, etc. The quotations are scrutinized by the finance and purchase committee before a final decision based on parameters like pricing, quality, terms of service, etc. The In-Charge Principal, finance along with the accounts department ensure that the expenditure lies within the allotted budget. Internal audit is a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction, whereby the college itself carries out the initial stage of the internal audit. The internal audit is carried out by experienced and qualified people appointed by the management. The major sources of Income are student tuition fees. All items of revenue and expenditure are judiciously budgeted for each upcoming year. The budget is prepared based on the actual expenditure of previous years and also the expansion requirements. The administration and finance committee monitors and audits the budgets, utilization, expenses, accounts etc. It ensures that the fund utilization is within the limit or allotted margin.

The external audit takes place annually after the completion of every financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an auditor with us is appointed by the College. Based on the audit of financial

statements, the responsibility of the auditor is to express an opinion in the form of Auditor's Report on whether the statements are fair. Finance team checks the bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure. All funds mobilized are properly accounted in the books of account. A finance committee has been constituted to monitor the optimum utilization of funds for various recurring and non-recurring expenses. The college aims at promoting research, development and other activities, involving the faculty at various levels. The Income tax statement is regularly filed. Institution follows transparency in transactions through bills and vouchers. All major payments are done through the Bank. The Institution has its own policy for utilization of funds as it is self-reliant and independent and manages the finances effectively. (Self-Finance College) . All the collections are deposited in the bank and all expenditure, recurring and non-recurring, are incurred through Cheques/Electronic mode. Only authorized persons by management can operate the transaction through the bank.
